## Pastor's Pondering

My article below was the subject of the Wednesday adult Bible study. We enjoyed a lively discussion and actually learned some things. I offer it to you in the hope that you will consider your opportunity to proclaim the Gospel.

## Thinking together about the "E" word

Mention the word evangelism around Lutherans and you're likely to get a mass exodus. For a variety of reasons we just aren't real good at it. Part of the problem is that we really don't know what it is even though we think we do. To help define evangelism let's name some common misconceptions.

## Evangelism is not:

- 1. Presenting a "sales pitch" about the advantages of accepting Jesus in order to obtain a home in heaven and then pressing for a verbal decision.
- 2. Inviting somebody to church.
- 3. Pasting a bumper sticker on your car with your church name on it.
- 4. Financing a billboard with your church name on it.
- 5. Creating a radio or television commercial about your church.
- 6. Good works done in the hope they create curiosity about the gospel.

I could go on but I think you get the point. What we commonly think of as evangelism is more correctly defined as soliciting and marketing. Of course both have advantages in their proper context but they are not evangelism. Hopefully you've identified the missing link in all the approaches above. That would be one person announcing the forgiveness of sin because of Jesus to another person. It is first person "I say to you . . ." speech. Thus, evangelism is simply another word for proclamation. Consider the following passage from Romans:

For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? <sup>15</sup> And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

This passage is best read backwards. How is faith created in people? The Holy Spirit using the words of a preacher and I don't mean just people who wear clerical collars and have been to seminary.

Of course you've already identified the supposed loophole in this passage, "how can anyone preach unless they are sent?" Well, you've been sent whether you know it or not. Consider this passage from Matthew:

<sup>18</sup> Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup> Therefore as you go make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Note the assumption Jesus makes. He doesn't say "if you go" he says "as you go." For some, this going is indeed a vocation as a professional preacher but it isn't confined to that role. Every Christian who has heard the news of the gospel has something to say to those they encounter as they go to work, school, play or wherever they find themselves.

So what is it that we go with? What is it that we have? Consider this passage from John:

<sup>21</sup> Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." <sup>22</sup> And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. <sup>23</sup> If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

#### And another from Matthew:

<sup>19</sup> "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven."

You have the ability to forgive sin. Jesus has authorized you to proclaim the news of the gospel. So taken together what we have so far is the faith in Christ that justifies comes through proclamation and that proclamation is done by Jesus' disciples as they go about life armed with the ability to forgive sin.

Hold on a minute before you run right out and becomes God's gospel gunslinger. Let's remember who's in charge of all this . . . God. God is a choosing (electing) God. Who he chooses and why he makes his choice is a mystery and frankly none of our concern. We don't decide who the chosen ones are. We proclaim universally trusting that God's will be done. Since God is in charge it is important to remember that we don't create opportunities for proclamation. Our role is to be sensitive to God given opportunities to proclaim and also willing to do the deed. Nothing is more frustrating than to have someone confess they've blown it and need forgiveness only to have a Christian look down at his or her feet and mumble about life being tough or some other nonsense. SPEAK UP!!!! You have the words of eternal life, USE THEM!!!!! So if we're not to be rabid fundamentalist who pound on doors and scream at people, how then should we go and proclaim? Consider this passage from I Peter:

But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.

Note the word priesthood. A priest is one that gives him or herself away on behalf of another. A priest is one that serves. Friend is another word that helps us understand what it means to be a priest. When applied to proclamation, one would proclaim to somebody he or she knows. Proclamation then is in the context of a relationship. Thus, proclamation is genuine and patient. Proclamation is in response to a confession, not the other way around. Law always precedes gospel.

To illustrate, one cannot help an addict until said addict hits "rock bottom." Likewise, proclamation is for a sinner who has no choice but to confess he or she is a sinner. This confession is created by God using the law.

So pulling all this together, as you go about being a friend in all your various relationships, be a good friend serving, helping, simply being there. If in the midst of a relationship a confession arises, then proclaim your friend's unconditional forgiveness for Christ's sake. You might start by being a friend to yourself because, after all, the gospel must be proclaimed over and over again and nobody has a closer relationship to you the sinner than you!

Admission is free. All proceeds go to benefit community outreach ministries including Harbor House, The Center for Violence Prevention (assistance for abused women and children), Rankin County Human Resource Agency, Mustard Seed, Grace House, Habitat for Humanity, Stewpot, and Lutheran World Relief.
